#### **DELAFIELD SEGMENT**

#### (3.5 miles)

The segment winds along the Bark River and includes a trek downtown Delafield before connecting with the Lake Country Recreation Trail.

#### **LAPHAM PEAK SEGMENT**

### (7.8 miles)

This hilly segment offers eager hikers more of a challenge. The Trail winds through beautiful woods and prairie restoration sties and includes outstanding views at the top of Lapham Peak.

#### HARTLAND SEGMENT

#### (6.8 miles)

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This segment connects Delafield to the Trail Community of Hartland. A highlight of the route is the chance to stop by three Conservationists' Hall of Fame commemorative sites.

## **HISTORY & RECREATION**

The City of Delafield prides itself in outdoor recreational opportunities and is also home to a rich history. Hawks Inn is a fully restored 1800's stagecoach stop. The Delafield History Center offers two Art Exhibitions per year, a photo collection: Delafiled Then and Now, with photos going back to the 1870's. A wonderful map collection and a research library in the lower level is available to visitors. Visitors may also learn about those that served our country at the Wisconsin Veteran's Memorial Riverwalk. While honoring the past, get a glimpse into the future by taking a campus tour of St. John's Northwestern Academies, a private preparatory and leadership development school for young male and female cadets. While in Delafield, take advantage of Nagawicka lake with access from Naga-Waukee County Park. Head down numerous, inter-connecting biking trails in downtown Delafield. 




