Hartland, a village nestled in the midst of "Lake Country", appeals with its vibrant, small town charm and plenty of amenities offered by a thriving business district. Known as a walkable community, Hartland has a pedestrian friendly pathway system along the gently flowing Bark River. Numerous, well-maintained parks are tucked away throughout the community.





WHERE TO HIKE

Unless otherwise noted, dogs are allowed on the Ice Age Trail and should be under control and leashed at all times.

HARTLAND SEGMENT

(6.8 miles)

As one hikes the paved trail through the Village of Hartland, they will discover shops, restaurants, amenities, and a lot of parks, as well as three Conservationists' Hall of Fame commemorative sites.

MERTON SEGMENT

(5.2 miles)

This jaunt along the Bark River closely parallels the Bugline Trail, built on an abandoned Kettle Moraine Railway bed.

MONCHES SEGMENT

(3.1 miles)

This segment traverses a mature maple forest and parallels the Oconomoc River and features spring and early summer woodland wildflowers.

EATS & TREATS

Stop by Birch & Banyan Coffee for a quick treat and coffee to-go as you explore downtown. Looking for a cafe with a twist? Check out Creole Café that serves up coffee and creole food. Enjoy a heartier meal and cultural charm at Senor Tomas Mexican-Latin Restaurant. If a juicy steak is on your mind, head to Palmer's Steakhouse. Zesti serves up delicious eats curated by a culinary master. For a resaurant and bar with strong Hartland roots, grab a bite at Endter's Sports Grill. Pick out a new wine to try from Tabi's Lake Country. You don't need to be a "snob" to enjoy Beer Snobs Ale & Eats, a local bar and grill in downtown Hartland. To end the day Little DipperZ ice cream has got your sweet tooth covered.

SHOPS & STOPS

The Hartland area benefits from a charming downtown shopping district, the Sendiks Hartland Plaza, Merton Plaza, and Cottonwood Plaza, each offering unique shops for variety and convenience. Visit Designer Consigner Boutique for second-hand clothing, décor, and accessories. Groceries and hiking snacks can be found at the Fox Brothers Piggly Wiggly. Need to relax after a long hike? Get a massage at Avalon Bodyworks or engage in a Vinyasa yoga session at Evolve to stretch your muscles. Finally, browse contemporary works of art at Lake Country Fine Arts Schools and Gallery.

RECREATION & RELAXATION

Hartland's charm is enhanced by extraordinary green spaces for residents and visitors alike. The Hartland Marsh hosts improved trails, boardwalks, and a 1.7 mile stretch of the Bark River. Two commemorative overlook sites, bearing informational markers, highlight your walk through the marsh. The Hartland Marsh has been a focus of many volunteer hours, restoring it to its current state of loveliness. It is a great place to visit if you are a 'birder' since many species stop here during their migration. As you might imagine, it also offers many great photo opportunities for every season, especially in Fall. The Hartland Public Library is a great place to cool off and view Hartland history. Located behind the library, the Hartland paved StoryWalk is a perfect educational outing. Nixon Park is home to the Splash Pad and Fine Arts Center and also includes a baseball diamond with bleachers and dugouts, four tennis courts, soccer fields, four shelters, restrooms, and play equipment. A pond fed by the Bark River provides hours of fishing enjoyment for everyone.




GET INVOLVED


