WHERE TO HIKE

Unless otherwise noted, dogs are allowed on the Ice Age Trail and should be under control and leashed at all times.



WEST BEND SEGMENT

(6.7 miles)

This segment offers many scenic hiking options. From Paradise Drive on the south end, the trail winds through peaceful woodlands, along a picturesque creek, a chain of lily-filled ponds, and a lake. The terrain grows more rugged to the north, with challenging dips, ridges, and moraines.

KEWASKUM SEGMENT

(5.4 miles, including 2.2 connecting route)

Rich in Native American history, the area was named for the Potawatomi word for "crooked river". Light forests and fields allow spectacular views of the surrounding areas. The Kewaskum Segment features an additional 2.5-miles of loop trails on the scenic Roman and Mercedes Otten Preserve.

MILWAUKEE RIVER SEGMENT

(6.9 miles)

This segment highlights include dense woodlands, sunny meadows, the Sunburst Ski Area, several boardwalks, intriguing long-range views, and a tunnel!

In addition to the Ice Age Trail West Bend, Kewaskum and Milwaukee River Segments, explore part or all of the 25-mile Eisenbahn State Trail.

EATS & TREATS

No matter what your appetite, you can find it in West Bend! Grab that perfect cup of coffee and make a difference at **The Hub**, a non-profit coffee shop that distributes proceeds to local nonprofits, including the Ice Age Trail Alliance! Enjoy good eats at **Sal's Pizzeria**, **Culver's** (right on the Trail), **Riverside Brewery & Restaurant** and **Dooley's** with outside seating available.

SHOPS & STOPS

The historic downtown marketplace is home to specialty shops, such as **Savoring Thyme** and **Mountain Outfitters**, offering gifts, apparel, jewelry and more. **Candyman on Main** and **Laughing Mountain Popcorn** are located on main street and will satisfy your sweet tooth.

If you need to make a quick stop for snacks before or after your hike, make a stop at **Pick 'n Save** on Main Street or West Washington Street, **Fox Bros. Piggly Wiggly** on East Washington Street, **Meijer** on South Main Street and **Sendiks Food Market** on West Washington.

RECREATION & RELAXATION

When you're downtown, explore the art and history of Wisconsin with over 5,000 contemporary and historic pieces at the **Museum of Wisconsin Art**. Continue your art tour outside, and take in the creativity of local, national and international artists along the **West Bend Sculpture Walk**, part of West Bend's scenic Riverwalk on the Milwaukee River.

The **Downtown West Bend Farmers' Market** takes place from 7:30 to 11am Saturdays through October at Old Settlers Park.

Looking for another way to get outside? Go Geocaching and ColdCaching! West Bend is the **Geocaching Capital of the Midwest™**. The Ice Age Trail Alliance's ColdCache program is based on Geocaching and Earthcaching where participants seek out natural features along the Trail. *GPS units are available at City Hall for no charge.*

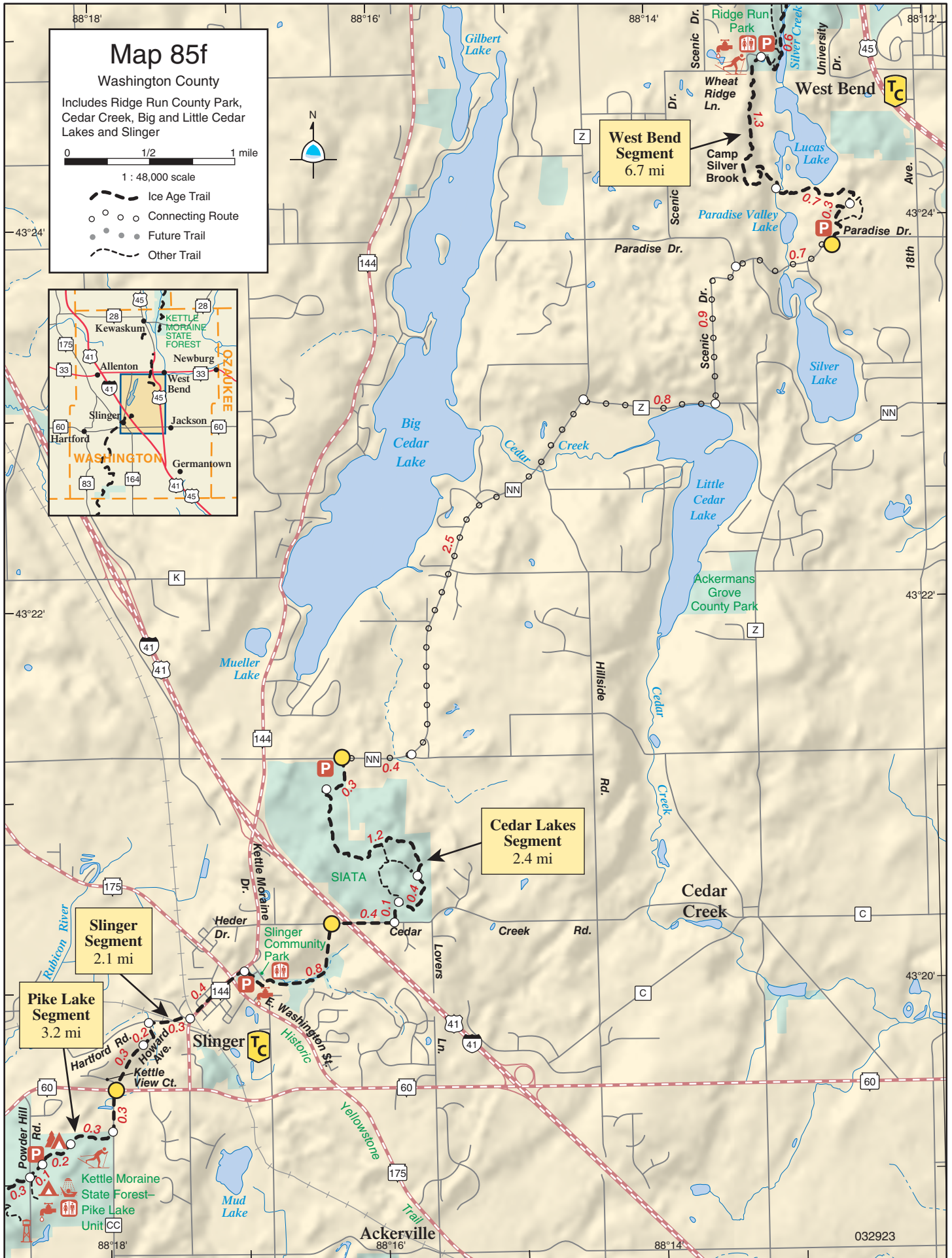
Washington County

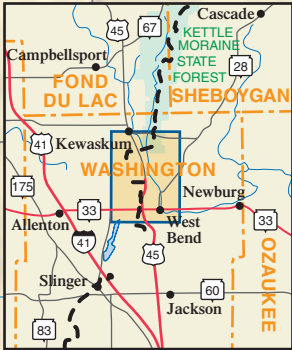
